Our Media Girls take photos and videos to share their stories while our Trailblazers tackle the wonders of the outdoors. With the support of trusted volunteers, Girl Scouts use their experiences to learn skills that give them the backing they need to soar.

This year we marked the 110th anniversary of Girl Scouts with the total return of in-person programs and events that celebrate the power of Girl Scouts. Our Girl Fest event in June served over 500 participants and featured stations from community partners like Catholic Hospital, Mental health place, and Long Island Power Authority. Our 2022 Annual Report is based on a truncated budget to align with the national fiscal cycle ending in September. Our 2023 Report will include information from October 2022 to September 2023.

Thanks to your support, we can provide Girl Scouts in Suffolk County with a safe space to grow so they can achieve their dreams. With community engagement and the backing of a global sisterhood, our girls join the legacy of empowerment that started 110 years ago. By uplifting the Girl Scout Mission and helping girls find their voice, we ensure that today's Girl Scouts are tomorrow's leaders. And we can't wait to see what they can do.



Our Mission: To build girls of courage, confidence, and character who make the world a better place.





In 2022, we offered additional training and online options to allow volunteers the freedom to access resources on a personalized schedule.

- Live virtual trainings: 20
- gsLearn courses completed: 5,840

Courses included training on troop management, badges and awards for program levels, inclusion for girls with disabilities, product sales campaigns, troop trips, and highest awards.

- New Leader Circle: focused on topics specific to the leader's first year of volunteering.
- <u>September 2022</u>: Launched the First-Year Daisy Leader Development Program, which gave first-year leaders the ability to engage via a Group Me texting app and exclusive access to monthly virtual sessions on topics such as "Planning First Meetings, Troop Trips, and Working with Parents/Caregivers."

Juliettes

Named after our founder, Juliette Gordon Low, are independent Girl Scouts who want to enjoy Girl Scout programming without a troop. They can attend events, work on badges and highest awards with family, and the help of Girl Scout mentors on a schedule that works for them.

Community Programs

Girl Scouts Explorations, a program in partnership with several local school districts, is for girls in grades K-8. This pathway offers the Girl Scout experience through staff-led programs held during lunch recess. This year's program series included work on badges for entrepreneurship, outdoor arts, camping, creative writing, civics, and the Becoming Me Program inspired by former First Lady of the United States, Michelle Obama.

Council Initiatives to Drive Membership Growth

Becoming a Troop Leader:

Virtual Zoom workshops to help guide prospective volunteers through the steps of joining Girl Scouts as an adult volunteer. Informational sessions include details on training, resources, and Girl Scout initiatives in their community.

- 14 Council staff run programs for Suffolk County from April to September.



Bronze Award

Highest award a Girl Scout Junior can earn. Bronze Award Girl Scouts work together as a troop to explore their community and plan and implement a project that makes a difference. (minimum project time 20 hours)



Troop 610 worked with the parks department to beautify their local hiking trails. They created a secret garden path with the hopes of increasing the use of the trails and getting people out and moving. The girls worked to clean the paths and add custom stepping stones along the way.

Troop 4946 worked with Little Flower Children and Family Services of New York to sponsor two cottages, a total of 16 girls, with Christmas trees, hand-made decorations, personalized stockings, and baskets of holiday treats. Through community outreach and social media campaigns, the girls were able to shop for and fulfill each girl's Christmas wish list.



Silver Award

Highest Award a Girl Scout Cadette can earn. Silver Award Girl Scouts work alone or team up in small groups to find an issue they care about and develop projects that lead to lasting change in their community. (minimum project time 50 hours)

Gold Award

Highest Achievement in Girl Scouting. Gold Award Girl Scouts use everything they've learned as a Girl Scout to help fix a problem in their community or make a lasting change in their world. (minimum project time 80 hours)



Eleanora Alloway created a 9/11 Memorial website and documentary to show her generation how communities came together after the tragedy. She interviewed & filmed first-person accounts that detailed the impact on the North Fork community and used her vision to educate her peers and help heal her community. She was selected as the 2022 Girl Scouts of the USA Gold Award Scholarship recipient from GSSC.

Climb with Courage


Our Girl Scout Cookie Program saw the return of booth sales, stand-a-bouts, and door-to-door sales and introduced a new cookie flavor, the Adventurefuls. In addition to the five skills, girls and volunteers learned the difficulties of supply chain management and inventory when delays and warehouse staffing issues disrupted deliveries. But these goal-getters found new ways to reach their goals by using the Digital Cookie program to engage with customers near and far.

And despite the drawbacks, their perseverance & entrepreneurial skills led to a 22% increase in packages sold!

Total Cookies Boxes Sold: 912,357 (up 22%)

- Total Girl Selling: 6,536 (up 9%)
- Per Girl Average (PGA): 139 (up 11%)
- Girl Participation: 82% (up 4%)

Digital Cookie participation has had a steady growth since 2019, up 165% (23% to 61%)

For over a century, Girl Scouts have proudly worn distinctive uniforms that symbolize the high ideals for which the organization stands.

Wearing a Girl Scout uniform shows the world that a girl is proud of her commitment to the Girl Scout Promise & Law.

Girl Scouts of Suffolk County has three retail locations and an online shop.

GSSC Monthly Kits introduced in March that could be purchased for a troop activity or individually for fun at home. Each kit contains everything you need, including activity instructions, materials, a patch or badge, and links to online resources so girls can expand their knowledge.

Girl Scout Camp and Mental Health

of girls feel like being in Girl Scouts supports their mental health.

In a world where 84% of Girl Scouts say they feel stressed about their futures, we know mental health is more important than ever.

For Summer Camp, we teamed up with **Project Hope**, which taught stress-relieving techniques, made stress balls and fidget sticks with the campers, and helped them talk about and acknowledge their feelings and anxiety.

Think Wellness NY ran yoga sessions and educated on the importance of exercise and stress reduction. They also taught sessions on nature and outdoor art.

Special Guests:

NY Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC)

Offered environmental education in a way that was fun and engaging on topics like Long Island's food chain and animal

habitats, and native species found in the lake at Camp Edey.

Cornell Cooperative Extension

Campers learned the importance of a balanced diet, and how to prepare snacks and simple meals, Campers enjoyed the snacks that they prepared and received a copy of the recipe so they could recreate the experience at home.



Long Island Disc Golf Association

Instructed campers on the rules of disc golf and gave them practical tips on how to improve their techniques. With their guidance, a nine-hole course was created on the west side of Troop House at the end of July. Fairways range from 30-60 feet and run through the open field.
